ALSI January 14 meeting by Al & Terri Cerutti

The Cafeteria Player was **Al Cerutti**, who was well received. He played a variety of songs including Italian, French and other ethnic music. The Mystery Player was **Jerry Odling**. He played many wonderful melodies that the audience recognized and enjoyed. He impressed all with his bellow shake.

The MC for the day was **Kjell Holmes.** He kept the meeting moving along nicely. The attendance was light again – We had lots of competition from the Chargers!!

The first player was **Joe Di Giacinto.** He played Gay Ranchero, Cold, Cold Heart, Clarinet Polka and several other selections. His fingers flew over the keys with expertise, giving a sample of his fine musical talents. His interpretation of familiar pieces is unparalleled.

Al Cerutti was up next. We really kept him busy at this meeting. He played Alley Cat Song, Glowworm, and When You Wish Upon a Star. He played with feeling, flashing his red colored bellows! His rendition of "When You Wish Upon a Star" made people want to sing along. It was exquisite!

Janet Martini gave us some background on her music from the early 1900's in California and how it is being gathered to be preserved. Her music generates pictures of rancheros and young senoritas. Her singing in Spanish is well done with her small red accordion she plays. Her songs were: Alma Angelina, Habanera Por Mi Mal, Es el amor mariposa and Los Camotes.

Russell Camp played Kjell's accordion and adapted quite well to a new instrument. Russell played a medley of Gospel songs: Standing on the Promises-Power and the Blood-Are you Washed in the Blood. Next he played My Anchor holds-We have an Anchor and finished with How Great Thou Art. Particularly moving was his playing of "How Great Thou Art." Russell puts his faith into his playing.

Jerry Odling played a German program with skill and feeling. He found this music in Vienna in a treasure trove of accordion music. True to Vienna, Jerry played 2 waltzes, Liebe Mit Silbergrauen Haaren and Ich Sag' Dir Dank' Schon Heut. His third piece was a well executed 2-step, Freunde Die Zeit Bleibt Nictt Steh'n. Bob Page shared music from his early days of studying accordion – jazz music that makes one want to dance – slow and smooth. Look out Frank Marocco...here is some solid competition on the jazz accordion! It's the Talk of the Town, Deep Purple and Lisa were Bob's selections.

After inquiring about the football game scores, **Ron Griffin** experimented with different bases on Lilli Marlene. His phrasing on "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" was distinctive and original. The first polka of the day, Sweet Little Girl Polka, came with Ron – great bellow shake! He played the Gay Ranchero beautifully by request and "without practicing", he said.

Sharon Marotte brought on another polka, Yodeling Polka, with a very distinctive run of notes that sounded like yodeling. Her Alpine Rose Waltz gave the audience visions of Austrian dancers, not missing a step. The Bouncing Polka was well executed and made the audience tap their toes!

Al Jacobs is the roving troubadour who this time played a Gershwin Medley like Gershwin should be played. He encouraged the audience to sing along. His playing conveys a love for the music which is contagious. His rendition of Granada was powerful as was Sabor A Mi.

Sharon Marotte and Tom Baxter are two people who always sound wonderful together — each compliments the other's playing. Tom played a unique right hand in Carolina in the Morning. Yours showed the versatility of both players. The capability of the accordion to convey and draw forth emotion was shown in Tell Me That You Love Me.

Break Time – We took time out to stretch and have a nibble out on the patio. It was a good time to visit with each other.

In an attempt to warm up with thoughts of warmer times, Vicki Eriqat played and sang Autumn Leaves in French and English. Well done! She always sings and plays with feeling. Vicki lead the audience in singing Do, Re, Mi.... but it was a very quiet audience. Her songs were: Autumn Leaves, Crazy, Do Re Mi, I Go Out Walking, Love Letters in the Sand.

Louis Fanucchi

Louis Fanucchi was born in Lodi, CA and moved to San Diego at age six months. Louis began accordion lessons at age 7-1/2 with Charles Bertolino and continued until age 15 after which he started taking lessons from Maestro Anthony Galla-Rini. Under Galla-Rini, Louis studied classical and free bass accordion.

Lou began his professional career at age 15 performing every Sunday in La Jolla and at age 17 every Saturday in Del Mar. Lou continued studies with Galla-Rini for eight years while simultaneously attending Palomar College and San Diego State University through 1985. He received a Bachelor of Music degree from San Diego State University.

Louis moved to Los Angeles for three years where he studied jazz accordion with Frank Morocco. In 1986 he bought his ultimate baby - a Petosa AM 1100. Through further study with Donald Balestrieri, Louis expanded his repertoire to command a broad genre of music styles compatible with the accordion.

Louis's versatility opened opportunities in motion pictures, television and radio. He has shared venues and performed with an impressive list of well known celebrities of stage, screen and television. In addition, he has performed with the St. Louis Symphony, The American Ballet, The San Diego Chamber Orchestra and Starlight Opera Company. Currently Louis performs and records around Southern California and the U.S. using his Petosa AM 1100 and MIDI Accordions.
